The names have been listed under one general heading with the initial of the town or district at the end of the description, as this arrangement was deemed more convenient.

The fact that all places within the territory are not numbered, and some are scarcely on a well delineated street, has made it difficult in all cases to describe the location briefly and in a manner accurate, but we hope we are offering a guide to the location of the residents of the section that will be of great service to the business men and the people in general.

SAN MATEO, BURLINGAME AND HILLSBOROUGH

In traveling down the San Francisco peninsula on the bay side, sheltered from the Pacific Ocean by the Santa Morena range, one first passes through or around the San Bruno hills, according to whether traveling via the Southern Pacific, which goes through, or the United Railroad; and enters San Mateo County. Continuing southward the hills grow higher, the valley wider, and the native trees more abundant. Just here the earliest homeseekers of the State found charming sites for country seats. Convenience to the metropolis, combined with beauty of landscape, and a climate unequalled made this section the choice of those who were able to gratify their desire for the best.

Thus was the town of San Mateo started and later followed Burlingame, close up to the northerly side, and latest the municipality of Hillsborough, covering the hills on the westerly side of both the other towns.

A total population of some 9000 has, with added transportation facilities, and subdivision of lands heretofore withheld, found its way to this choicest of suburban retreats. Half an hour on the best of trains and rolling stock will take you to this spot via the Southern Pacific railroad. It takes twice this long at present by electric cars.

Naturally this neighborhood has the best of schools and churches, model streets and sidewalks, with many civic organizations keeping up the effort towards higher development in all civic matters.

Of the schools it may be specially noted that we have here the oldest boys' military school in the State, St. Matthew's school, and, while new, a high school which in completeness of buildings and equipment is a model for any city.

Some of the church and lodge buildings are also of note. The Episcopal church at San Mateo with its organ and art windows cost about \$100,000, and is remarkable in many ways. The Masonic and Elks' buildings of San

Mateo and Masonic building of Burlingame are also imposing structures.

The Red Cross hospital is one of the interesting institutions, having a complete, though not large, but well equipped building, soon to be enlarged at a cost of \$100,000.

San Mateo has a free library containing 7000 volumes with two librarians, and Burlingame has a small library with larger things before them to be achieved.

"The hotel with a garden"—The Peninsula—is a large and well equipped hotel with some 300 rooms, situated in grounds once owned and perfected by the late Alvinza Hayward, a mining capitalist of note. The native trees alone make a park of the grounds, and many trees and shrubs from other climes perfect the charming surroundings. The interior of the hotel provides every comfort and is unexcelled in cuisine and other appointments.

The charm of beautiful gardens, drives in all directions, picturesque scenery, enchanting walks, and in fact all those things which go to make up all one can desire in suburban life are here. Organized effort is always at work striving with success in reaching out to even better things in this community.

To the seeker after a home where the comforts and advantages of modern life are always to be had, this locality is truly ideal. If he also seeks a place where his investment is not only safe but sure to be financially profitable this is also the ideal place to invest his money. Its environment, if he looks at the map, will tell him this though he had never beheld its charms.

The pressing population of the great metropolis of the Pacific Coast of necessity must spread its homes over this territory. When such a demand is imperative, values must rise. It is open now to new comers at very reasonable figures.

The locality was never in so good a position to welcome the stranger and to prove its attractions as it is today.
