



Harmony and a fine school spirit have marked the term of 1911-12. The new student body constitution has had much to do with promoting this spirit. (In establishing the Executive Committee the constitution provides for a representative form of government, by which the business of the student body is carried on more expeditiously than heretofore. The students have on all occasions supported their representatives and officers.

This year Lodi has not made its usual splendid showing in athletics. The girls have a good team, and easily won all their games until they met Turlock. Being defeated by this team they lost their chances for the subleague championship. The boys made a brilliant beginning early in the season, defeating Stockton on its own court, and winning many games outside the league. Success was short-lived, however, and the team, crippled by the loss of several members, was forced to withdraw from the race for the state championship. Although Lodi lost the championship of the state this year, there is good material in the school, and we hope in the future to turn out from a fine new gymnasium building winning teams of well-trained athleties.

In April, 1911, Lodi and the eight outlying districts formed by petition the Lodi Union High School District. For some time it had been known that a new High School was needed, and the trustees decided that the best way to raise the money for a new building would be to bond the district. After an exciting campaign, an election for bonding the district for one hundred and fifty thousand dollars was held and the bonds voted. The Hutchins site in west Lodi was chosen

for the new building. The great success of the plans for the new high school is due especially to the trustees, Messrs. E. E. Morse, F. B. Mills, N. W. Shidy, F. Perrott, and W. S. Montgomery, and to our principal, Mr. Inch. Credit is given in the campaign article under School Notes, to other gentlemen who worked long and earnestly for the Lodi Union High School.

Two additional teachers, Miss Harford, a specialist in history, and Miss Wright, instructor in music and drawing, were added this year to the High School faculty. Many students have taken up drawing and some fine work has been done. Members of the Glee Club get some credit for their work, and the time is near at hand when with the advantages afforded by the new building music will be a regular subject.

A new activity this year is debating. A large number of the students have taken up the work, and the debating season has been a lively one. Three interclass debates were held, contests which tended to increase class spirit. This work is of great value, and especially to those who find it hard to speak in public. Taking part in debates has brought out many a student who otherwise might have blushed unseen during all his school life.

The class of 1912 is the link between the old order and the new. Entering as a freshman class of the Lodi High School, its members are the first to be graduated from the Lodi Union High School.

To this issue of "The Tokay" the staff has added several new features. The various school activities are grouped under the heading of Organizations. With the advantage of a special teacher in drawing, the students have attempted more cuts than usual. The cover design, by a student, Albert Randolph, is also something new for the annual.

The associated students of the Lodi Union High School wish to thank Mrs. Mason for her gift of ten dollars to the student body at the beginning of the term. We also owe the Lodi Sentinel thanks for the many courtesies it has extended to us.

The editors wish to thank the judges, Miss Howell, of the Stockton High School, Mrs. George Meissner, and Mr. M. O. Holt, for their services in the prize-story contest. As they did not agree upon any one poem, Miss Cooledge and Mr. Inch were asked to decide the question.
