# Football at Night

HE ASSOCIATED STUDENTS of the Lodi Union High School installed a system of lights on the athletic field. The system includes strong and powerful lights in bath tub like reflectors which are placed in pairs on eight separate tall telephone poles. These light up the field so well that it is as light as day if not lighter. The turnout to the first game was very large, and the crowds did not tire of the novelty of night football games. The condition proved to be ideal for the players.

A squad of seven block "L" gridders and fifteen circle "L" veterans besides twenty-five other aspirants for grid positions and honors answered the first call of the new football coach, Barney Hagen, for the football season of 1930. The first squad was led by the very capable Leon Mettler. Captain Mettler, as usual, played outstanding football the entire season. He, as well as Engel, the center, again won a position on several of the potential sectional teams. Other outstanding players of the season were Moore and Mondavi at fullback, Shaw and Blewett at tackle, and Hori at end.

The Turlock—Lodi game was a poor exhibition of football playing. Both teams showed the lack of that extra finish that comes after much practice. After an exhibition of interchange of punts the final score stood 19—0 in favor of the Lodi team.

The squad journeyed to San Jose, October 4, to meet the San Jose team in the first game to be played between these two teams. Since the day was very warm, the game was slow. An interesting incident of the game was Blewett's being knocked a little silly and refusing to come out of the game. The Garden City team defeated the Lodi team but the Flames are awaiting the time when San Jose will come to Lodi.

The Woodland-Lodi game was an exhibition of good football.

Because of the fact that a few Sacramento boys broke the rules of the California Interscholastic Federation by burning an "S" on the lawn of the Lodi Union High School, the C. I. F. required Sacramento to forfeit the Lodi—Sacramento game. The Sacramento High School deserves the very highest commendation for the excellent sportsmanship which they displayed in handling this situation.

The Flames seemed to lack that old "fighting Flame" spirit so well known in local football.

The Tigers of the College of the Pacific ate up the Flames in no uncertain manner by taking all the first places and a majority of minor places. At the Davis and Sacramento meets the Flames came away down in the list of winners. The only meet the Flames won was with Oakdale. This meet was a very poor exhibition as neither team had all of their regulars with them.

As the Oakdale meet was held on a picnic day, there was a poor turn-out of Class "B" men. The score was 81—31 in favor of Oakdale.


At the Modesto sub-sectional meet, Thiel placed second in the football throw.



## The Year, A Success


HE GIRLS' athletic program was this year a huge success both from the standpoint of the coach, Miss Stella Haglund, and of the athletic manager, Grace Moore,


Besides following the regular sport program this year, the girls participated in the Field Day program May 1. Their part consisted of marching, and folk dancing. A
