With this successful season another chapter will go down in the Mariposa annals of fame.



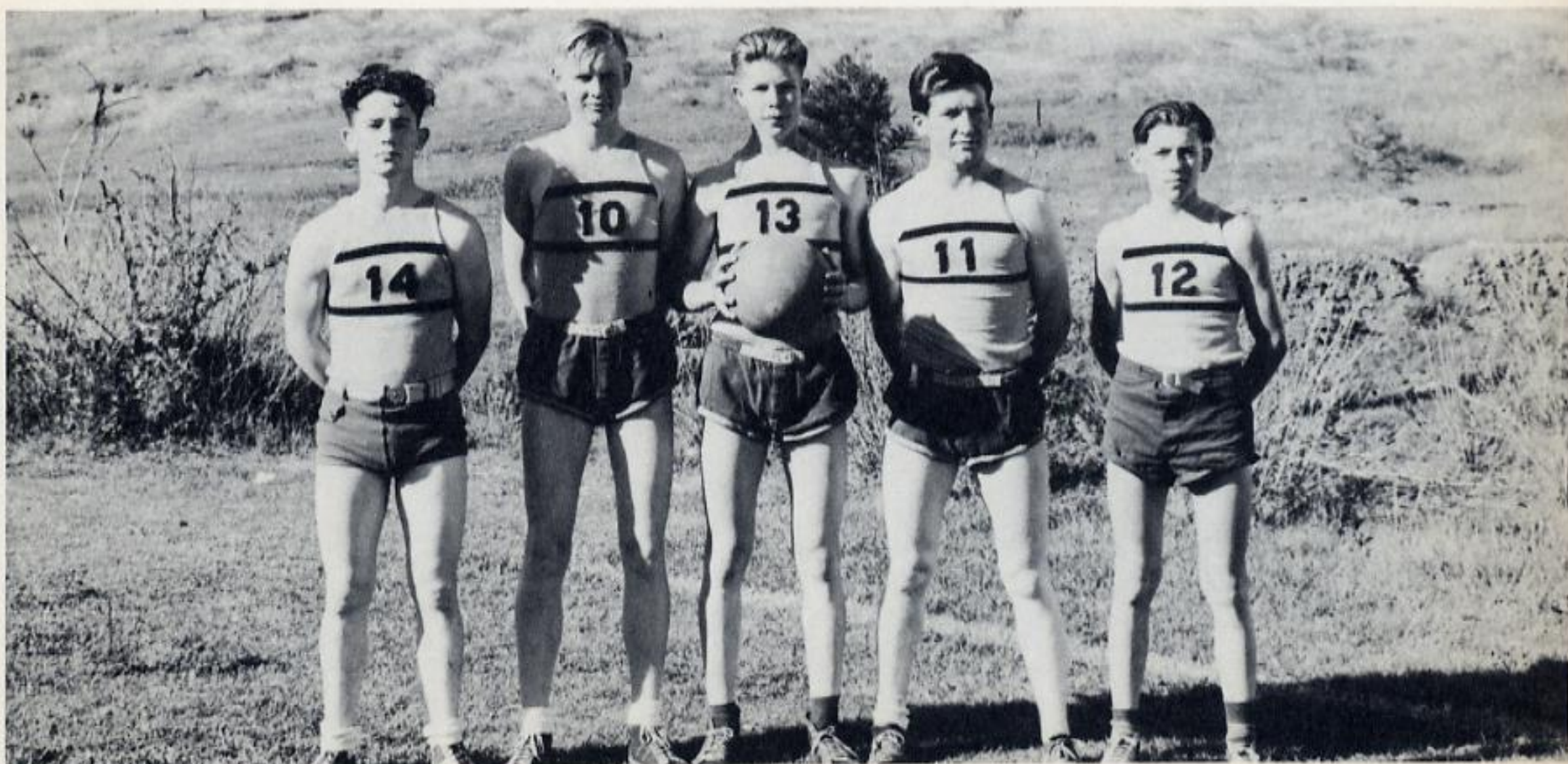


"A" BASKETBALL

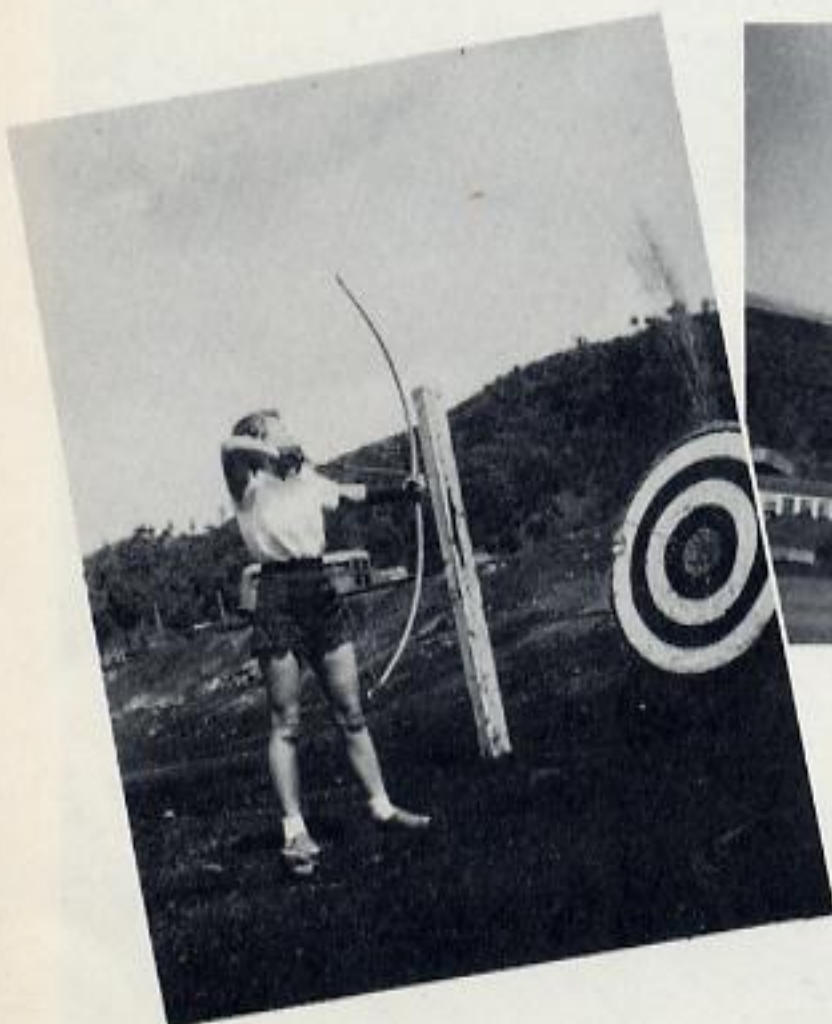
SWEATER GIRLS
