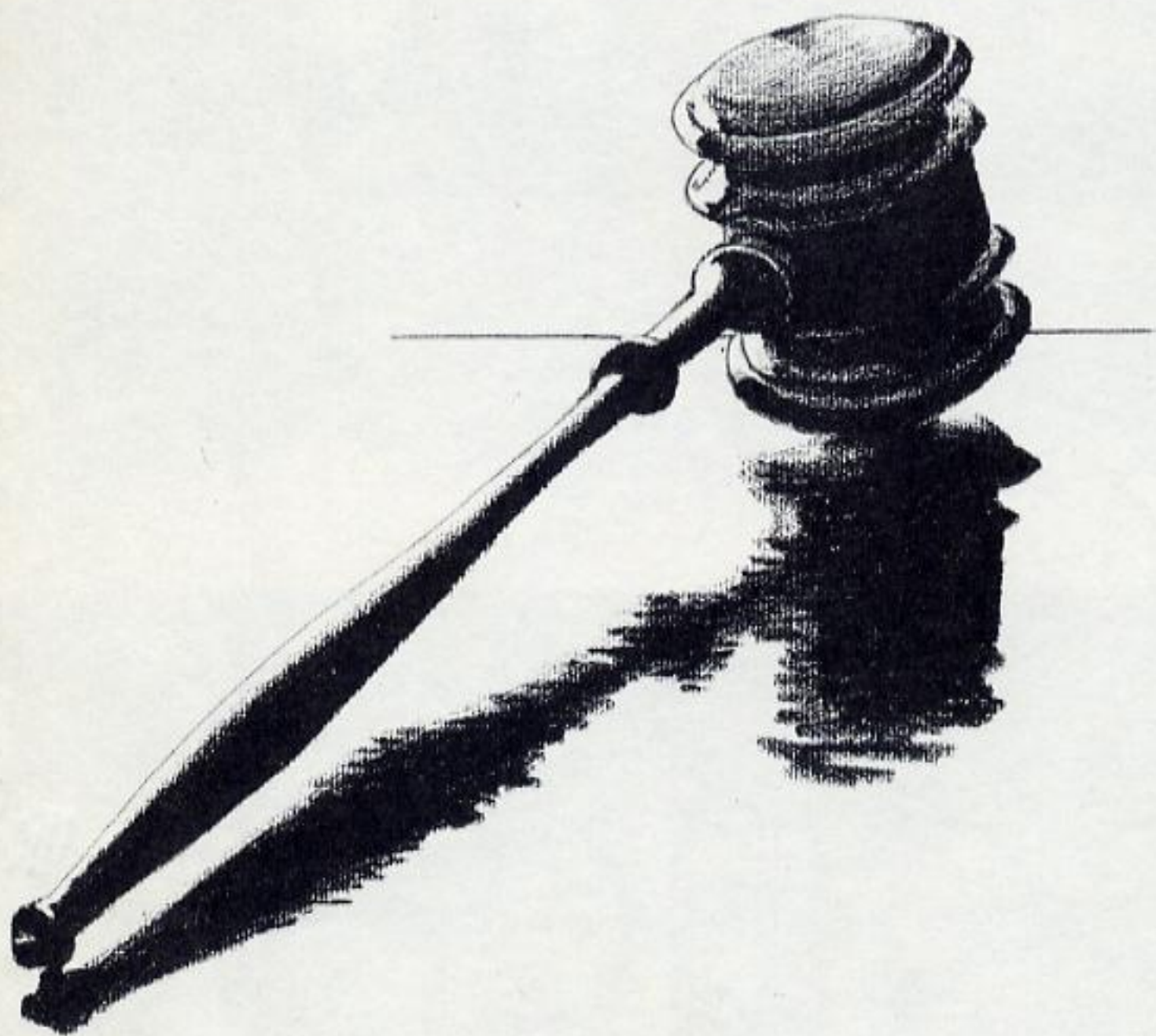

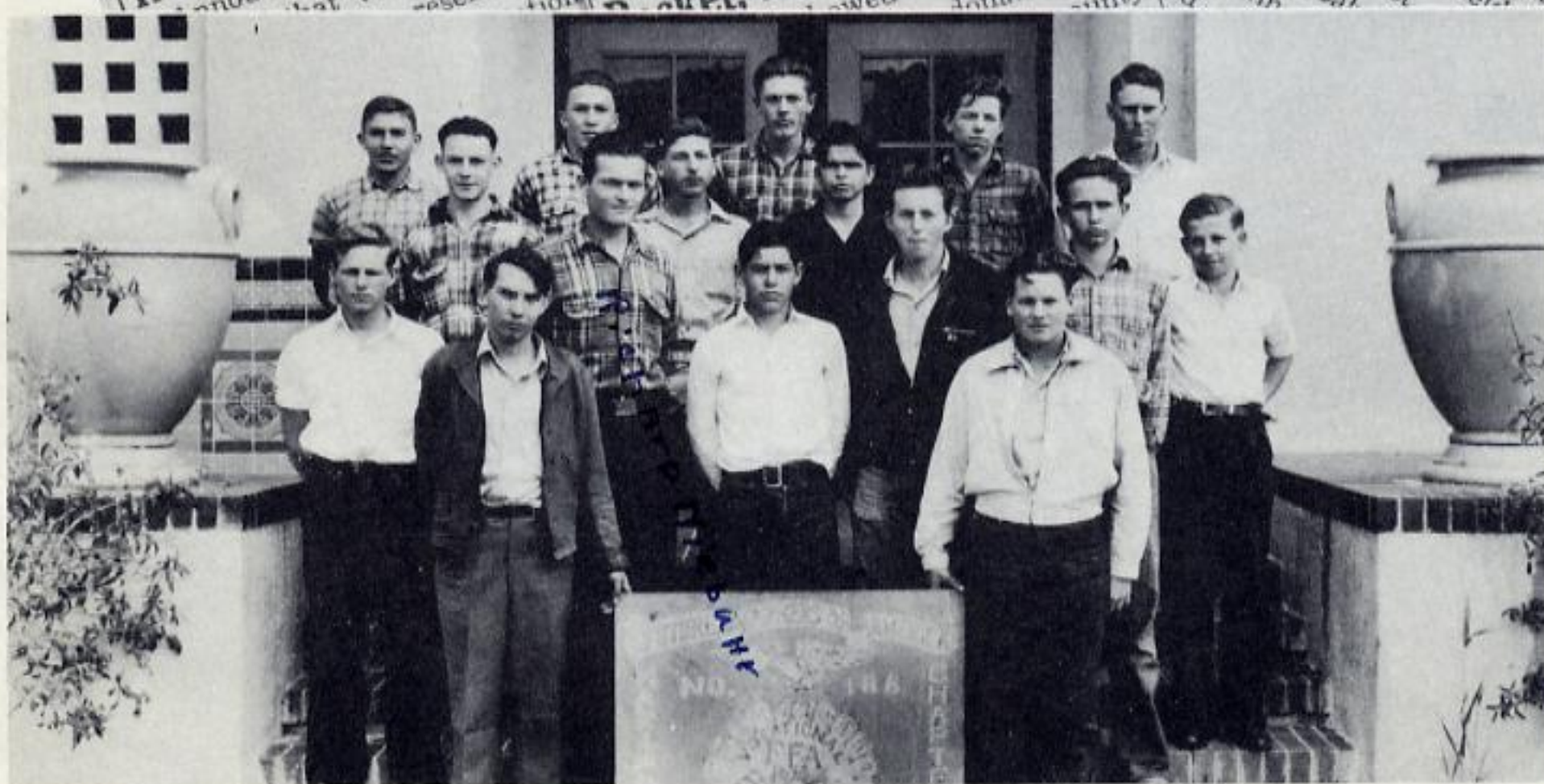

The FFA Chapter showed its benevolence by donating a Christmas basket and a check to the Red Cross.

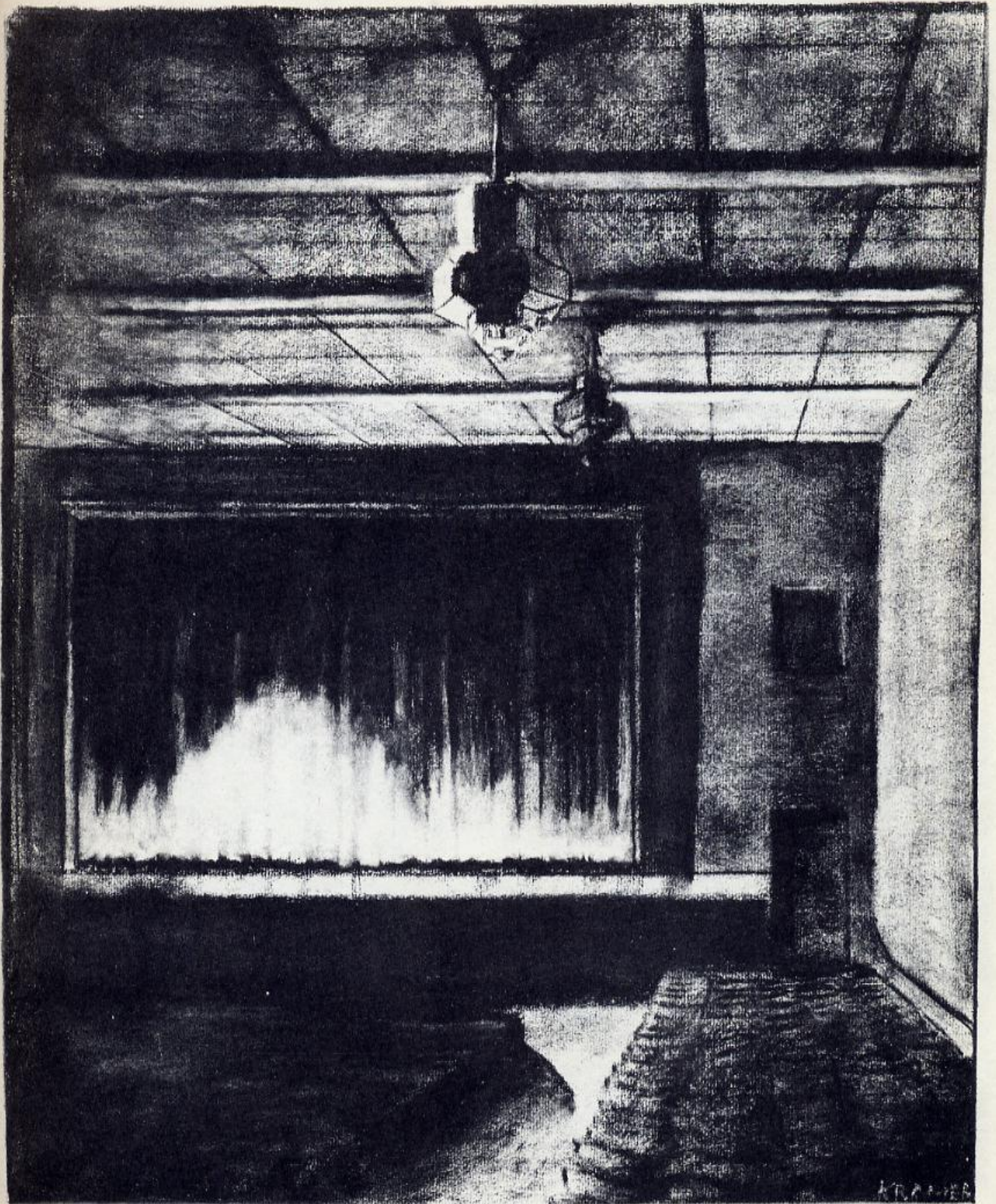
Second Semester Election Brings New Officers
