Stockton, 39; Woodland, 11.







Stockton High School's crew again gained fame for its alma mater when it defeated the Oakland Technical High School crew on May fourteenth at Lake Merritt in Oakland.

The race was over a half-mile course, about the length of the lake, and the Blue and White, after a hard grind, crossed the line two boat lengths in the lead.


This is the fourth time that Stockton has defeated Tech. The first Stockton High crew went to Lake Merritt in 1917 and-was beaten by University High, but outraced three other schools, Fremont, Oakland, and Tech.

In 1918, the Blue and White, in the fastest time ever made over the course, beat Tech. by five boat lengths.

In 1919 the crew lost to Tech. by half a boat length.

The 1920 crew won, and got, for one year, the three-year cup offered by the Oakland Playground Commission. This year the crew won the cup a second time, and when won once more, the trophy will become the property of the school.

SWIMMING

A swimming team was organized by Captain Goldwater early in the season, but, as he left school, Zent was elected to fill his place. A number of last year's men were back, and with some new recruits a winning team was soon under way.

In the interclass meet the juniors took the honors. Sacramento forfeited to Stockton, and, as practice was needed to beat Berkeley, a meet with the Stanford "varsity" was arranged.

Stanford "Varsity," 30; Stockton, 29.

A great deal of credit should go to the Stockton swimmers for holding the Stanford varsity to such a small score. Stockton won first and second in the 220-yard with Goldwater and Souza; and first and second in the 50-yard back-stroke with Zent and Patten. The 100-yard dash and breast stroke were very close, Stockton losing first places but winning both seconds and thirds. The diving went to Stanford as did the relay, the deciding factor, which was lost by about a foot.


Stockton, 57; Berkeley, 38.

Although a close meet was looked forward to, Stockton rather overwhelmed Berkeley in the most here. McMurray created a great sensation when he beat Chapin, who holds the high school record, in the 100-yard and almost tied him in the 50-yard dash. Souza was another strong factor in the meet. The plunge was the climax, Stockton winning all three places with Miller, Stiles, and Reid. The relay was won by Berkeley. The point winners were: Souza, 12; McMurray, 11; Miller, 5; Herman, 5; Tumelty, 5; Baxter, 5; Kenyon, 4; McCarty, 3; Stiles, 3; Patten, 3; Burke, 1; Zinck, 1.

Captain Zent was sick and unable to swim, or Stockton's score would have been larger. He is a sure first in the back stroke.

By this meet Stockton won the northern championship. When the annual went to press, a trip south was looked forward to to decide the state championship. The results of the meets there were not known; so Stockton did not know then who would be the competitor.

Track

TRACK

The track season of 1921 was quite successful, notwithstanding the few meets held, one with Sacramento and Ripon having been canceled. Captain Hammond and Coach Cave had a good bunch out every night for practice. Those who signed up for the various events were: Sloan, 100 and 220; Captain Hammond, 440 and 880; Seifert, 100 and 220 hurdles; Ashley, 440 and 120 hurdles; German and Coffin, 880 and mile; Campodonico, 220; Krenz, shot and discus; Farnsworth, high jump; Badger, shot and broad jump; Foster, Seifert, and Wallace, pole vault; Campodonico, Seifert, Waggoner, and Sloan, relay; and Ford, 220 and relay.

Seniors, 53; Juniors, 41; Sophomores, 27

The interclass track meet was closely contested through the three upper classes, Sloan being the only freshman to run. Hammond and Badger were the big point winners for the seniors. Seifert and Farnsworth starred for the juniors.

Stockton, 901/2; Ripon, 471/2

This meet was run at both Stockton and Ripon,—the track events at Ripon and the field events at Stockton. The track score went to Stockton, 50 to 21; and the field events, $40\frac{1}{2}$ to $26\frac{1}{2}$. Ripon had a distance man that was hard to beat. He captured both the mile and 880.

Stockton, 601/2; Auburn, 521/2

Stockton defeated Auburn in a closely contested dual meet on the local oval by a score of $60\frac{1}{2}$ to $52\frac{1}{2}$. The relay team, composed of Seifert, Badger, Ford, and Sloan, saved the day for S. H. S. Auburn was strong in the distance and the field events, while Stockton showed well in the sprints, hurdles, and broad jump.

C. I. F. At Davis

Stockton High took fourth in the northern section meet at Davis with 121/8 points, about twenty-five schools contesting. Those who scored were: Hammond, Seifert, Badger, Krenz, Farnsworth, and Foster.

State C. I. F. Meet

The annual state track and field meet was held at Berkeley, on the University of California oval. Stockton entered the six men that placed at Davis, and two of them placed at Berkeley. Krenz placed second in the discus, and Badger third in the broad jump, making four points for Stockton. The meet was won on sixteen points by Lincoln High.

Auburn, 61; Stockton, 60

Stockton lost the last track meet of the season to Auburn High by one point. Badger and Seifert were big point winners for Stockton. Sloan, Ford, Campodonico, Foster, and Farnsworth could not take the trip, and their absence weakened the team greatly. Hammond also made a good showing by taking firsts in the 440 and 880.
