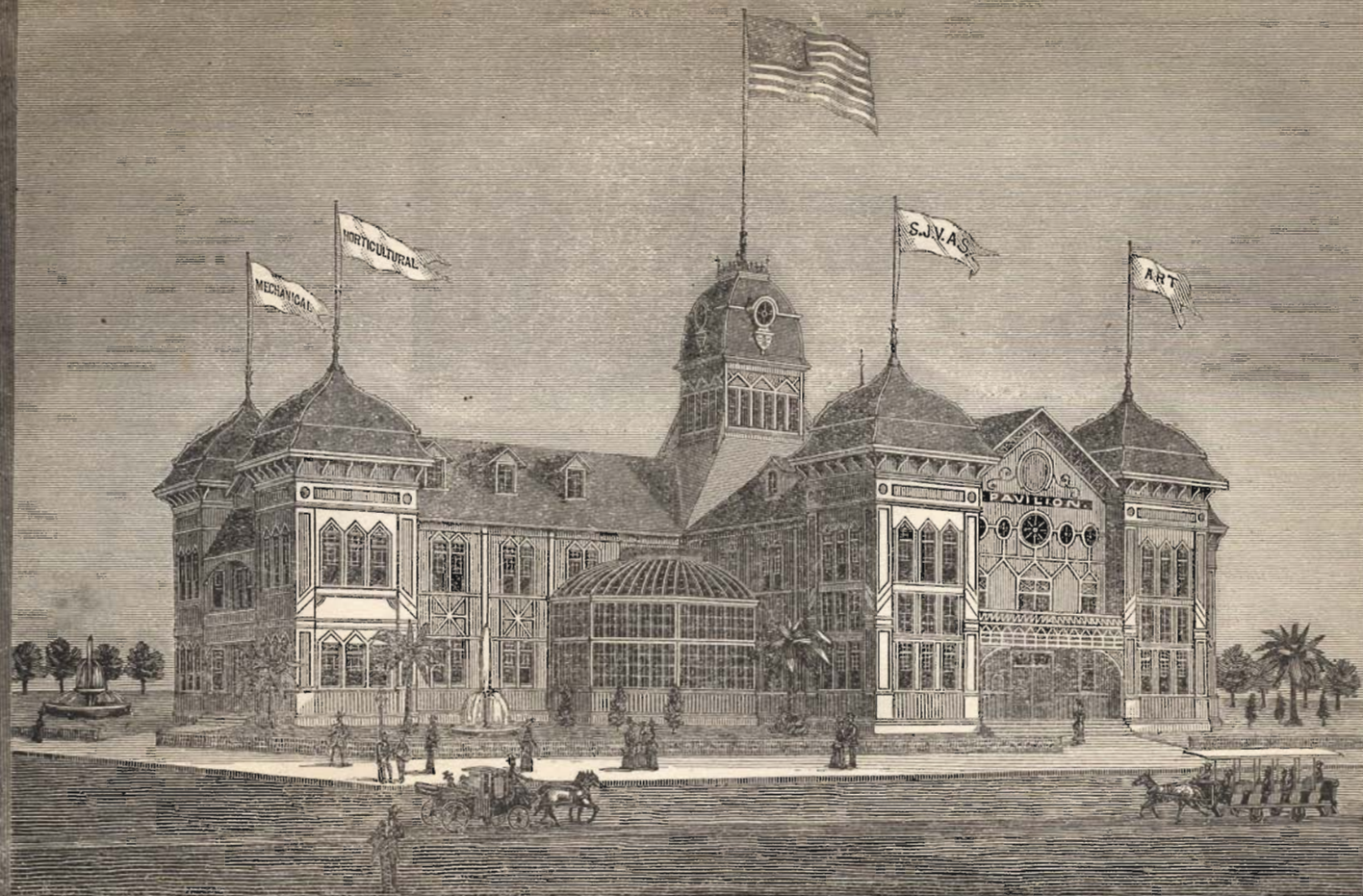

## SAN JOAQUIN COUNTY.

San Joaquin County contains 800,000 acres of land, most of which is susceptible of cultivation. It is crossed by the San Joaquin River, which is navigable the year around, furnishing cheap transportation. Forty and fifty bushels of wheat to the acre and as high as sixty bushels of barley have been produced in different parts of the county. The soil in a great part of the county is also first class for production of all kinds of fruit, and quite a large acreage is planted each year. With facilities for irrigation from the Calaveras, Mokelumne and San Joaquin Rivers, almost anything in the line of fruits or vegetables can be successfully grown. Altogether the San Joaquin is one of the richest and most productive valleys in the State.

## STOCKTON CITY.

Stockton, the county seat of San Joaquin County and the largest city in the San Joaquin Valley, is located on a level plain about three miles from the San Joaquin River. Being at the head of tidewater navigation, Stockton possesses the best of facilities for transportation of heavy freights. One result, in part, at least, of this facility of transportation is found in the large number of manufacturing establishments located at Stockton. The capacity of flouring mills now running and in course of construction will reach about 6,000 barrels per day. Manufacturers of agricultural implements, harvesters, carriages, wagons, street cars, etc., have found here a favorable location, putting in circulation large amounts of money paid to workmen. Stockton is thus one of the liveliest and most enterprising cities in the State.

Natural gas is obtained in abundance from numerous wells, one sunk by the county supplying all county offices with light and fuel. The new county Court House, costing \$300,000, of which the people of the county are justly proud, is one of the handsomest structures in the State.

The State Asylum for the Insane is located in Stockton, its grounds within the city limits having an area of 100 acres.

San Joaquin County, and especially Stockton, is well supplied with first-class schools, in which the people have always taken a deep interest. The Stockton High School is one of the accredited schools from which students enter the State University without examination.
