

"Well done" is the phrase to describe the 1952 football season for the Stockton College Mustangs. Compiling an impressive seven and two loss record, the SC contingent brought to the campus their their first Big Seven Junior College Conference championship since the introduction of the K-6-4-4 plan.

The Mustang gridsters met with opening night difficulties as they lost their '52 debut by a score of 20-7 to Bakersfield J. C. Nevertheless, led by Coach Earl Klapstein and Assistants Don Hall and Gene Martin, the Mustang herd did not fall into a lethargy by this defeat. The SC squad bounced back to beat L.A.C.C. 40-6, Sacramento 35-13, Modesto 53-7, Santa Rosa 27-7, and West Contra Costa 14-7, before being tripped up by the mighty Tartars of Compton College to the tune of 31-6. Again the Mustangs came back with two more impressive wins over the C.C.S.F. 20-0, and San Mateo 18-0, to clinch the Big-7 championship with seven straight wins without a loss in the circuit, a feat quite extraordinary in a league as strong as Big-7. Thus we pay tribute to the Mustangs of Stockton College for a performance "well done."

Stockton College Colts

The Colts of Stockton College, under the able tutorship of Coaches Carl Peregoy and Frank Boyle, found themselves in a tie for second place in the strong Sac-Joaquin Conference, after a successful '52 grid season. The Colts were hot and cold at times but managed to grab their share of the winning honors. Like their older brothers, the Mustangs, the Colts found themselves on the short end of a 25-0 score in their opening game against the powerful Yellowjackets from Berkeley.

Undaunted, the Colts tripped Vallejo by a score of 26-13 and McClymonds 27-6, before being upset by Modesto 12 to 19 in a close contest. The SC grid squad rebounded again, blasting McClatchy 27-0, Turlock 14-6, and Sacramento 19-7. Woodland reversed the process on the Colts, beating them 13-7, but the latter grabbed another 34-13 win over Grant before losing to the Bakersfield Drillers 13-14 in a fog-filled stadium.

Memorial Stadium was the scene of the annual clash against their bitter rivals from Lodi. Lodi, nevertheless, stopped the Colt aggregation 33-13.











Halfback Gene Campbell digs for those few extra precious inches as two opposing team members attempt to stop him for all they're worth


