

The SC Mustangs had only a fair season this year with a 3 win - 6 loss record. However, the Tangs were sparked by excellent individual playing by several members of the team.











Middle picture: Butch Williams and Don Velez go over the high hurdles with form and rhythm.






Top picture: Leon Moore (left) and Eddie Torres (right), gave their all to beat the man from McClatchy (center) in the 100.


